Thanks to the Lions we have so far been able to purchase additional kit for students to borrow year-on-year including 12 hiking rucksacks, 10 roll mats, additional sleeping bags and walking boots. We hope to increase our stock of tents and Trangia's this year as we now have a fantastic 45 students signed up to Bronze in Year 9, 20 students completing Silver in Year 10 and around 40 students finishing DofE sections in Years 10 and 11...

It was also a special moment for four of our students who represented Broadoak at the Uphill Village Remembrance Day service. The students delivered a reading and laid a wreath on behalf of Broadoak Academy.

It was a very proud moment, and the students represented their community with real dignity and respect. It was humbling to be there with members of the wider community and to share this commemoration with them.





Year 7 and 8 Visit to SEE MONSTER

SEE MONSTER caused a nationwide buzz this Autumn and 75 pupils from Year 7 and Year 8 had the opportunity to receive an exclusive tour around the exhibition as part of SEE MONSTER's school visits.

Our students were led around the 35-metre installation which explored sustainability, renewables and the great British weather. As the SEE MONSTER sat within Weston's Tropicana, its proximity to Broadoak allowed us to travel to and from the SEE MONSTER solely by foot, an eco-friendly mode of transport that aligned with SEE MONSTER's sustainability message.

Our School Dog Mentor – Meet Fleur

The Dog Mentor Affiliated School



Dog Mentors are dogs who are trained to work with children and help them. The Dog Mentor will work with children and staff within the school to create a positive impact on:

- Communication
- Self control and confidence
- Discipline and Resilience
- Empathy and Relationships
- Focus and Concentration
- Stress Coping Strategies

Our Dog Mentor has 4 handlers in school, Miss Back, Ms Loewy, Mr Brenton and Ms Wyman. Her name is Fleur. You will know if Fleur is in school as there will be a sign on the door of Reception to say she is in.

Fleur is 15 months old. She is a golden retriever from a long pedigree, dating back to 1500. Her Mum is called Nala and she left her Mum when she was 2 months old. Fleur is Miss Smith's pet and lives at home with her and her older sister (not her real sister!) Hydii who is 4.5 years old. Hydii is also a golden retriever. Fleur also loves hanging out with her favourite Aunty Amber who is an 8 year old German Shepherd.

We have rules to help us look after Fleur - the rules are for everyone, even if you are very confident with dogs:

1. Ask before you stroke
2. Pick up litter / objects that might make Fleur unsafe
3. Always approach Fleur calmly, do a Fleur breath first
4. Always walk around school, **no running**
5. Always wash hands after being with Fleur
6. Always make the handler aware if you are allergic to dogs
7. Always let the handler know if you're worried about meeting Fleur – no one has to meet her if they don't want to
8. No loud voices – **no shouting the dog's name**
9. **No screaming with excitement to see dog**

What will Fleur do?

Fleur will be working on training with some students. Fleur will be on the gates and have breakfast some days with some students. Fleur will listen to some students read. Fleur will visit classrooms to check on you. Fleur will also take part in some other fun activities like taste testing and grooming. Fleur will also be walked and some children will be able to do this as well as take her to play on the field.

Period Products for All

At Broadoak we always have a supply of period products, such as pads and tampons, available to our students in various offices and classrooms across the school to ensure everyone can still access education. Having periods should not be a barrier to education for anyone.

We would like to make parents aware that we have recently seen an increase in the number of students asking to leave lessons because of an issue related to their period and how we support students with this. Period products are available in school for all who need them, when they need them, in order to access education. We know that making girls aware of the scheme is vital to making sure they can access period products when they are needed and to reduce the stigma surrounding periods. Anyone who needs to access period products in their place of learning to access education can ask for this support. This may include, for example, where individuals:

- have forgotten their products
- cannot afford products
- have come on their period unexpectedly

Products can be found in 'Sunflower' boxes across the school or in the Main Office and medical room. We have also been trialling issuing "period pants" to students experiencing heavy periods and this has been very well received. Unfortunately, the funding available does not enable us to give out multiple pairs of the underwear to all students but we would like to promote their use which has proven to make students feel more protected and confident with managing their periods. <https://www.modibodi.co.uk/>



Important Assembly Topics - Men's Mental Health

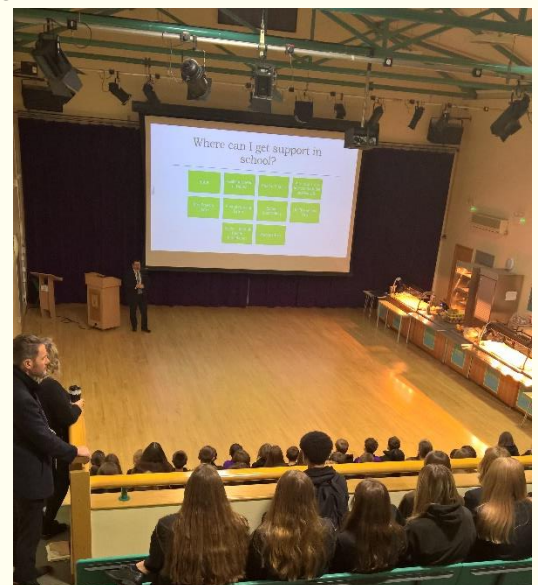

It is never easy to discuss such topics with young people, but it is essential that they get to hear about what can affect the mental well-being of men and how/where they can get support.

During the assemblies, we talked about the stigma attached to speaking out if you are a man and suffering from poor mental health. We encouraged all our young men to speak out and seek support. We also asked our young women to support our young men to help them get the support they need.

TIKTOK Safety – Parent / Carer Guidance

Below is a fantastic parents guide on TIKTOK from National Online Safety. TIKTOK has been found to be the most-used social media platform for 12-17 year olds. As always if you have any safeguarding concerns about a young person or need advice, please email us at...

If you find a Tik Tok or social media account using the Broadoak logo, name or photos of students or staff and you don't believe it to be an official account, please also let us know and we can work with the Online Safety Network for it to be reported and removed.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about TIKTOK

TIKTOK is a free social media platform that lets users create, share and watch short videos ranging anywhere from 15 seconds to 10 minutes in duration. The app gained notoriety for its viral dances, trends and celebrity cameos and can be a creative, fun platform for teens to enjoy. Now available in 78 languages, it has more than a billion active users worldwide (as of spring 2022) and is most popular with the under-18 age bracket. In fact, a 2022 Ofcom report found TikTok to be the most-used social media platform for posting content, particularly among young people aged 12 to 17.

AGE RESTRICTION 13+
(Certain features are restricted to over-18s only)

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT
While TikTok's "Following" feed only displays videos from users someone follows, "For You" is a stream of clips based on their previously watched content. Most videos on a child's "For You" feed will therefore be light-hearted and amusing, but it could potentially surface something unsuitable. TikTok's guidelines prohibit the sharing of adult or inappropriate content, but the sheer volume of uploads mean they aren't manually monitored and vetted.

DANGEROUS CHALLENGES
Due to TikTok's immense popularity, some videos have unfortunately been influenced by videos challenging users to perform harmful or even deadly acts. One extreme example was the "blackout" trend, which encouraged users to hold their breath until they passed out from a lack of oxygen. It led to two females filing lawsuits against TikTok over the tragic deaths of their children.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS
With around 1.3 billion users globally, the potential for contact with strangers on TikTok is high – especially as accounts can be set to public by default. This not only means that someone's profile is visible to anyone else on the app, it also lets their videos be suggested to others and enables anyone to comment on them or download them.

IN-APP SPENDING
TikTok is free, but users have the option to buy TikTok coins, which can be used to purchase virtual gifts in the app. These amounts are then sent as rewards (retaining their monetary value) to other users for videos they've created. Coin bundles range from £3.99 to an eye-watering £99. TikTok's policy is that they can't be bought by under-18s, but it's a painless to bypass this with a fake birthday.

ADDICTIVE NATURE
Like all social networking platforms, TikTok can be addictive. Figures show that young people are spending increasing amounts of time in it. In the UK, children with TikTok spend an average of 102 minutes per day on the app, versus 53 minutes on YouTube. This compulsive repeated use can interfere with their sleep patterns – leading to irritability – and distract them from other activities.

TIKTOK NOW
Introduced in late 2022, the "TikTok Now" feature lets users shoot & share video or photos at the exact same time as their friends. Users receive a synchronous notification at a random time of day, giving them time to take a video or real-time photo. This addition can not only be a distraction to young people but could lead to them inadvertently sharing private content such as their location.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING
Family Pairing allows parents to link their TikTok account with their child's and control their settings remotely. Parents can then, for example, turn on Restricted Mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content), set screen time limits, and manage their child's ability to send messages (and to whom). Children can't alter these settings without parental approval.

MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE
Although under-18s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, bypassing this setting is relatively easy. However, parents have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their videos won't be visible to strangers and they won't be able to exchange messages with people who aren't on their friends list.

LIMIT IN-APP SPENDING
If your child is using an iPhone or Android device to access TikTok, you can alter the settings to prevent them from making in-app purchases. We'd recommend that you enable this feature, as it's quite easy for a young person – without realising what they're doing – to spend a significant amount of real money buying TikTok coins so they can unlock more features of the app.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS
If your child wants to use TikTok and you're happy for them to do so, it's crucial to talk about the potential risks in this type of app. For example, ensure they understand not to share any identifying personal information – and that they realise they could be exposed to inappropriate content. Thinking critically about what they see on TikTok can help children become generally more social media savvy.

READ THE SIGNS
If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something inappropriate or upsetting that they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs: increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, as are failing to complete homework or regularly not eating meals.
