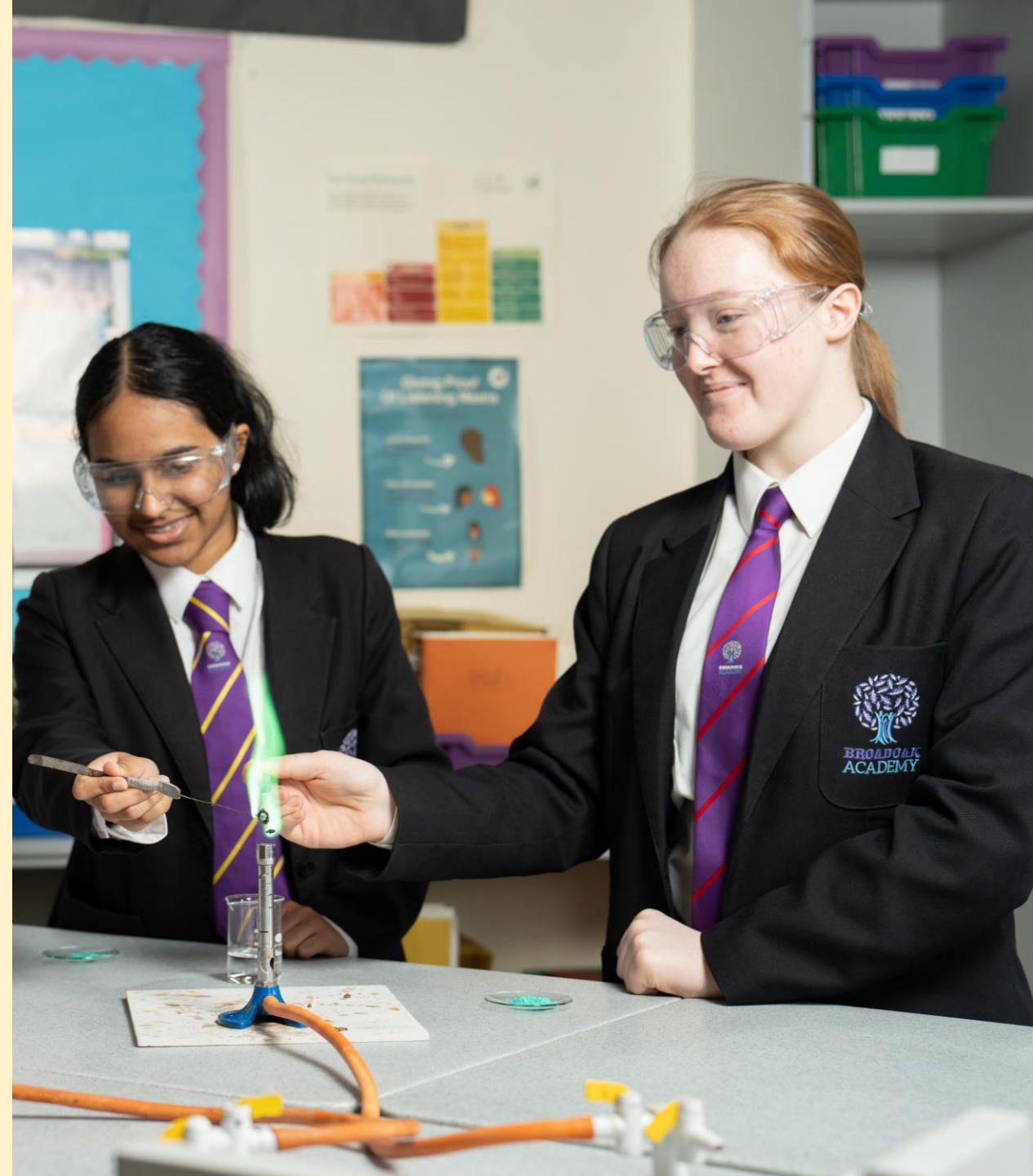


What happens in Year 10?

Students study fewer subjects than they do now and undertake national qualifications.

- There are some subjects which remain compulsory:
 - **English** (Language and Literature)
 - **Maths**
 - **Science** (Combined or Separate)
 - PE – core non-examined
 - PSHE – non-examined

Students then choose **four** additional subjects from two blocks or 'buckets'.



Students study **nine GCSEs** from **three** different subject blocks:

Core subjects x5 lessons per week

All students will study:

- English Language
- English Literature
- Maths
- Science (combined OR separate)

Not assessed by a formal qualification:

- Core PE
- PSHE

EBACC subjects x3 lessons per week

All students will study **at least one** of the following:

- Geography
- History
- French OR Spanish
- Separate science

Additional curricular

- Computer Science

Reserve choice

All students will select **two** subjects as a reserve. You may be given your reserve.

Open subjects

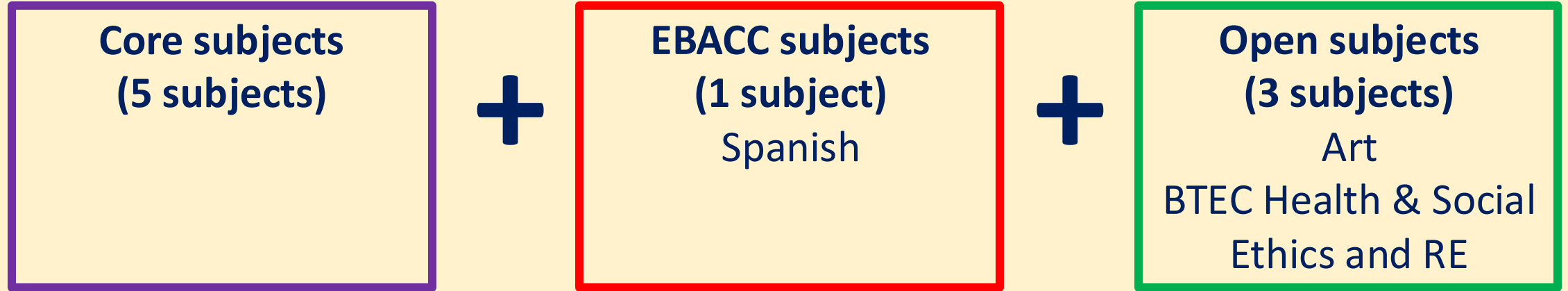
x3 lessons per week

- Statistics

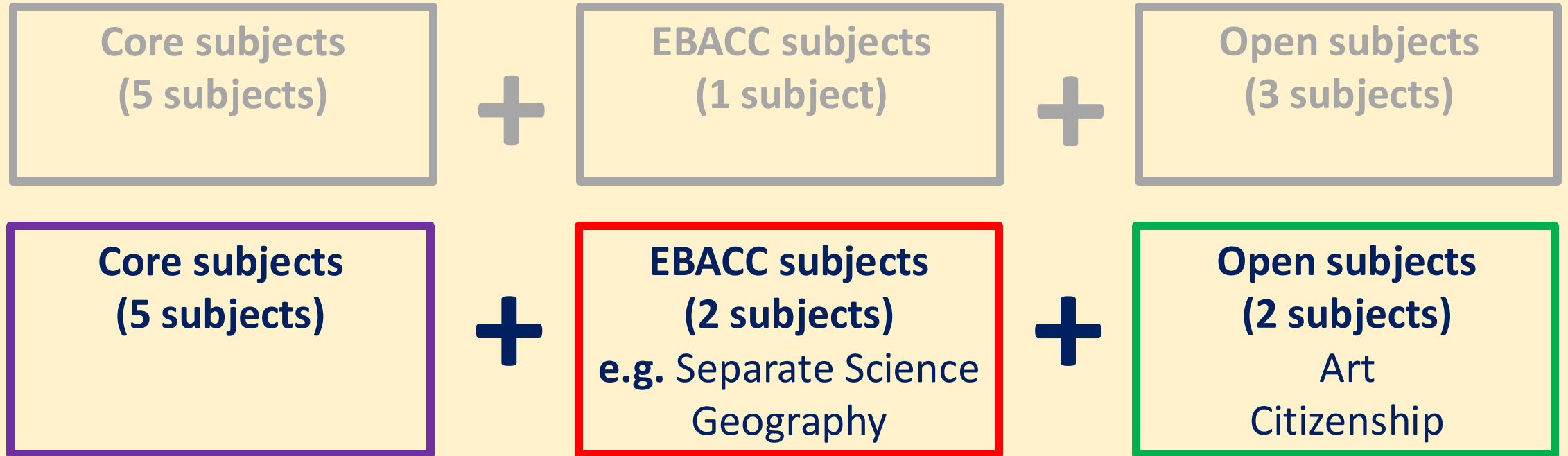

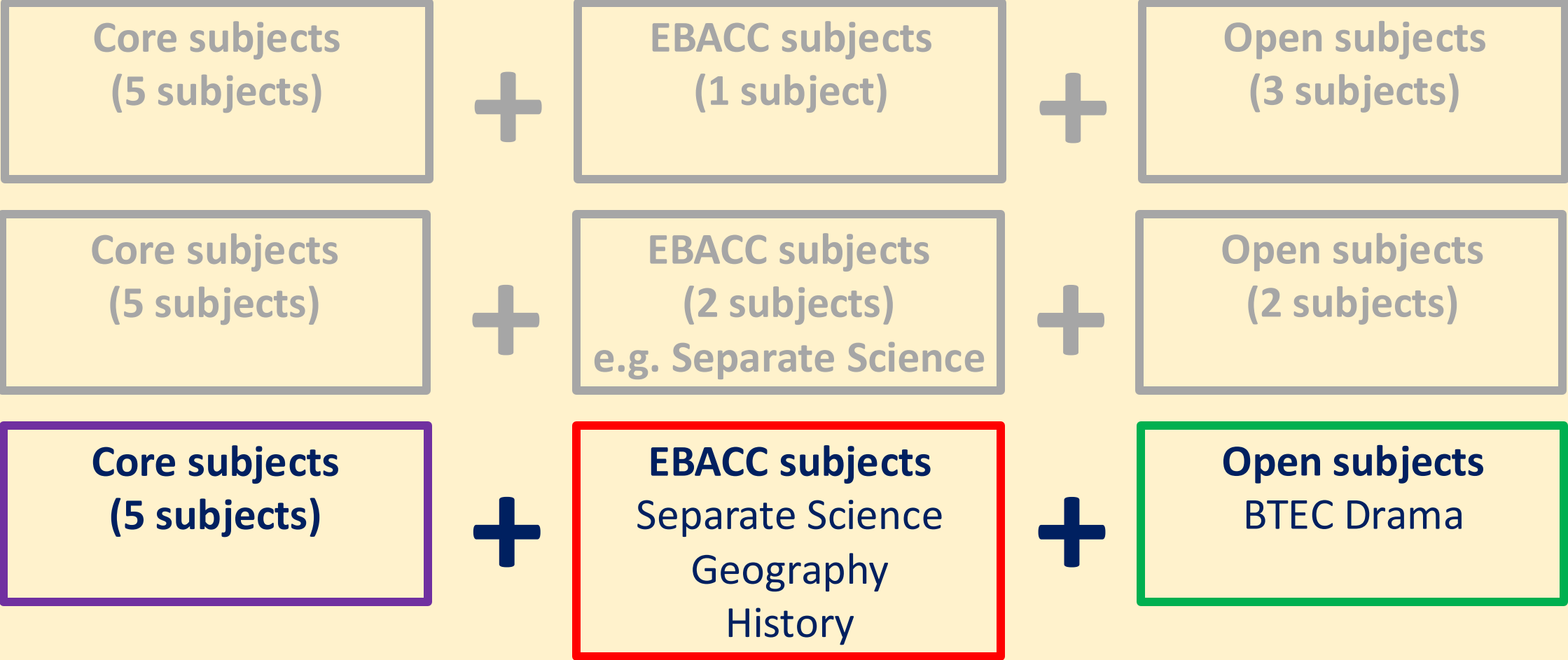

We **cannot guarantee** you will definitely study all the courses you select.

It is almost certain that some of the course advertised will not run in September due to staffing or uptake.

This is why we will ask you to choose **two reserve** subjects you would be happy to study instead.

How are different subjects assessed?

There are three different ways you could be assessed for your GCSE qualifications.

- Most GCSE subjects are assessed by two or three exams in the summer of Year 11.
- Some subjects like BTEC Health and Social Care, Hospitality and Catering and BTEC Sport are vocational courses and are assessed by one exam and a significant body of coursework.
- A few subjects like Art, Photography and Drama are assessed through a portfolio of work and a performance based exam.



What is the difference between GCSEs and vocational GCSEs?

If you have a good idea of what job or employment sector you want to go into and want to start preparing for the world of work or further training, then you may wish to select a vocational GCSE course.

Vocational courses suit those who enjoy a hands-on approach and who want to reduce the number of exams they sit. All vocational courses will have one exam, but the majority of assessment will be made up of coursework. We offer the following vocational courses at Broadoak:

How do I decide what subjects to study?

Make sure you do your research properly and find out what you will study on each course and how you will be assessed. Make the most of the evening tonight. Gather as much information as you can.

- Choose subjects you enjoy and find interesting
- Choose subjects that will help you for the next stage of study or employment (both the knowledge and the skills it will provide)
- Choose subjects that compliment each other and give you a variety of different experiences and opportunities.
- Choose **two** reserve subjects you would be happy to study if needed.

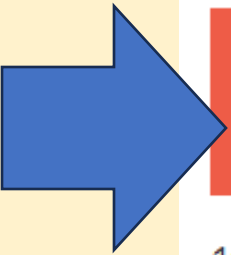
